NHS Poster Competition

- One highly commended certificate per entry will be awarded to the top entries per region.
- One certificate for best school entry will be awarded to each school who has no regional winners or highly commended entrants.
- Winners will have their entries showcased in an online gallery.
- Whether they enter individually or as a group, each student will receive a prize if their entry is chosen.

They will be judged with this criteria:

30%: student appeal

• Fun, lively and appealing to peer group. Was the idea/solution showcased effectively? Does it have clear structure and presentation?

30%: creativity

• Are there any creative ideas shown? Is there anything particularly innovative in its execution? Have the student(s) created something different?

40%: understanding

• Understanding of role in job advertisement and what it involves such as duties and tasks. Understanding of entry routes to chosen career including qualifications and skills needed.
